FAITH-BASED ENTITIES: Valuable to the Community



Faith-Based entities have always been an essential element in the world, providing opportunity for change and fostering social, political, and community development. These agencies play a major role in providing services to individuals in the United States. Faith-based entities are non-profit organizations (voluntary and community groups) that focus on several issues at the community level such as leadership, health, education, financial sustainability, the environment and other social issues. These entities range from small congregation-based soup kitchens to multibillion-dollar social service and economic agencies.

Notably, the Salvation Army, Catholic Charities, and Feed the Children are international and national organizations that have a ubiquitous impact throughout the world. In addition to the international and national faith-based institutions, there are some local faith-based organizations that are significant in the development of their local communities in Alabama. One example of an organization that is making a difference in Alabama is the Greater Peace Community Development Corporation (GPCDC) located in Opelika, Alabama. The mission of the Greater Peace CDC is to forge common community identity and develop shared vision among major groups and stakeholders within the community for the development of community-based leadership to economically revitalize distressed neighborhoods in the Lee County area.

The GPCDC was established on May 16, 2000 as a public non-profit organization. The GPCDC has developed and conducted a host of programs that emphasize youth, community, and economic development. The GPCDC's involvement in youth development includes the following: Pre-K Program, Child Development Center, Youth Leadership Academy, Summer Enrichment Program, STEM and Mentoring/Tutoring services. In the area of community and economic development, the GPCDC has conducted a Fatherhood Entrepreneurship Workshop (assisting non-custodial fathers in the development of small businesses to financially support their families), constructed 48 single-family homes and conducted several workshops on leadership, community development, financial empowerment and a host of other topics. Also, GPCDC is a part of the Alabama Association of Community Development Corporations (AACDC), the statewide organization that provides leadership and resources to community development corporations in Alabama.

Greater Peace and other local faith-based entities will continue to play a major role in society. Non-profits are critical in the overall success of each community. As we prepare for our upcoming leadership programs, let's always remember the significance of the faith entities in our local region. Please engage them in the discussion and note they are there as a valuable resource for the betterment of the community. Identify the faith-based entities in your area and develop a plan to work with them.

STARTING STRONG

Have you ever attended a workshop or presentation and the opening comments from the speaker were somewhat lackluster? How did you feel? Were you excited and eager to hear more? Most likely not. One of the most important parts of a speech is the beginning. The start sets the stage for the remainder of the presentation. The goal of every speaker should be to motivate participants to listen

attentively throughout his/her entire presentation. To do this, a strong opening is necessary.

What makes an opening strong? According to Leadership Strategies, a strong

opening line captivates the participant's attention, interest and buy-in at the beginning. One successful method that trainers employ is the IEEI – Inform, Excite, Empower, Involve – method. Below is a brief description of how to utilize the **IEEI** method at the beginning of a presentation.

- **Inform** the audience about the session purpose.

EXAMPLE – “The purpose of this workshop today is to _____. When we are done, you will be able to_____.”

- **Excite** participants about the benefits of this presentation.

EXAMPLE – “By completing this program, you will achieve _____, and this will help you_____.”

- **Empower** attendees by discussing the significant role they have been given by completing this training session.

EXAMPLE - “You were selected to participate in this critical educational session because of _____.”

- **Involve** audience members by asking them their personal objectives for the workshop.

EXAMPLE – “Because your involvement matters, please tell me what your personal objectives are for this training session?”

She holds her B.S. degree in Family and Consumer Sciences and her M.S. degree in Extension Education from Mississippi State University. Patti also received her credentialing in Family Development from Auburn

Throughout her career, Patti has been involved in numerous community and economic development programs. She served as the executive director for Leadership Pickens for 21 years, directed Leadership Greene for 8 years, and helped establish other leadership programs throughout Alabama's Blackbelt region. She was a founding member of the Pickens County Tourism Association and served as the organization's president for several terms. Patti is one of the founding members of the Alabama-Mississippi-Tennessee Rural Tourism Conference and is an active member of the Pickens County Industrial Development Board as well as the Aliceville Museum and Cultural Arts Center. Mrs. Fuller was selected as the first female president of the Aliceville Rotary Club and helped establish the Greene County Rotary Club. Patti also spent 14 years serving on the Aliceville City Council.

Patti currently serves on the advisory board for the State of Alabama Department of Tourism and recently was invited to join the Board of Directors for West Alabama Bank and Trust. Additionally, Patti and local farmer Annie Dee of Dee River Ranch, represent Alabama as lead farmers on the Farm Journal Foundation, located in Washington, D.C.
